# Reading: Exodus 16: 2-4, 9-20, 31

<sup>2</sup> In the desert the whole community grumbled against Moses and Aaron. <sup>3</sup> The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the LORD's hand in Egypt! There we sat around pots of meat and ate all the food we wanted, but you have brought us out into this desert to starve this entire assembly to death."

<sup>4</sup> Then the LORD said to Moses, "I will rain down bread from heaven for you. The people are to go out each day and gather enough for that day. In this way I will test them and see whether they will follow my instructions.

Then Moses told Aaron, "Say to the entire Israelite community, 'Come before the LORD, for he has heard your grumbling."

<sup>10</sup> While Aaron was speaking to the whole Israelite community, they looked toward the desert, and there was the glory of the LORD appearing in the cloud.

- <sup>11</sup> The LORD said to Moses, <sup>12</sup> "I have heard the grumbling of the Israelites. Tell them, 'At twilight you will eat meat, and in the morning you will be filled with bread. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God.""

## Reading: John 6: 22-35 Jesus the Bread of Life

- <sup>22</sup> The next day the crowd that had stayed on the opposite shore of the lake realized that only one boat had been there, and that Jesus had not entered it with his disciples, but that they had gone away alone. <sup>23</sup> Then some boats from Tiberias landed near the place where the people had eaten the bread after the Lord had given thanks. <sup>24</sup> Once the crowd realized that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into the boats and went to Capernaum in search of Jesus.
- <sup>25</sup> When they found him on the other side of the lake, they asked him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?"

### <u>Sermon</u>

I'm sure you've heard many anecdotes about modern people's ignorance of the sources of the food they eat. Many struggle to think beyond the supermarket carton of milk to the cow; beyond the vacuum-packed rashers of bacon to the pigs; beyond the eggs in the carton to the hens, often kept in cages pecking at each other, rather than free to peck and rootle in the open ground as nature intended. And even when people try to grow their own they sometimes misunderstand the plants in their care: a popular TV presenter recently became a laughing stock when she revealed that although her corn on the cob plants seemed to growing well, when she pulled them up she was disappointed that there were no corn cobs growing underneath. Her co-presenter found it hard to stifle his laughter as he explained that the cobs grew at the top of the plant, not among the roots like potatoes! And then of course there is the famous BBC April Fool spoof film about spaghetti trees!

Just as many people today are unaware or unmindful of the true source of their physical food, so even more are unaware of the heavenly source of many of the 'good things' of life. An attitude of thankfulness used to be expressed in the Grace said at meals, thanksgiving services for safe harvests, thanksgiving services for deliverance from many of life's ills. Nowadays, although there may well be thanksgiving services planned when the Covid pandemic is finally deemed to be over, I doubt that as many people will turn out for them as turned out weekly for the national round of applause for NHS and other key workers.

This morning's gospel reading from John highlights the lack of understanding of those who had actually participated in the feeding of the five thousand miracle. Many seemed to have stayed on the spot into the early hours of the morning – no need to hurry away now their bellies were full! Maybe they were half-hoping for another free meal the next day, or to see yet another amazing feat performed by Jesus. Actually they missed it in the dark, as he walked on the water out to his disciples' boat! Eventually they realized that Jesus and his disciples had all gone, and so they went looking for them on the other shore of the lake.

Being pursued yet again by crowds, someone less discerning than Jesus, his disciples for example, might have assumed that those who came searching were doing so in response to the deep spiritual experience of receiving the bread and fish the previous day. 'Look how many have been converted to faith in Jesus as Messiah and heaven-appointed king! God's kingdom is on the brink of being fully realized!" they might have been secretly thinking.

But Jesus knew better. Most of those who had received the broken bread and fish yesterday didn't realize the full meaning of Jesus' (and God's) miraculous provision for them. Most of them didn't see it as an irrefutable sign of God's glory, so much as an indication that following Jesus could give them more of what they wanted. The 'what's in it for me' culture is not a modern development: it stems from our human sinfulness, going right back to the beginning of the human story.

Of course, Jesus himself points them away from seeking only temporary physical benefits, towards seeking the eternal blessings which God will pour out through him. So now they realize it's not going to be handed to them on a plate, and ask, 'What must we do for God to give us what we desire?' Most of those present had been brought up to believe that salvation came through birthright and through careful observance of the Law and Temple sacrificial ritual. So it's natural for them to assume that there are other practices or regulations that Jesus can prescribe that will bring them finally to their desired goal.

But Jesus says it's not about doing, it's about believing in him - much harder and far less easy to measure. In modern culture, when we talk about believing we tend to mean subscribing to a list of ideas or statements (such as the creeds) and acting in accordance with them, which is not dissimilar to the Jews' approach to the Law, the will of God for their lives, as revealed to Moses. But for Jesus, belief is a relationship with him: a relationship of trust and acceptance of his authority as God's Messiah (and Son).

In response to his words here the people make it clear how little they had understood yesterday's feeding miracle. Even though they had been part of the event and the recipients of the bread and fish, before they will believe, they still require Jesus to prove to them who he is by some miraculous sign. As far as they can see it, the onus is not on them to have faith, but on Jesus to convince them! They need evidence that he is greater than Moses, through whom God provided food for them in the wilderness after they left Egypt. If the feeding miracle of the day before was not sufficient to convince them, one has to wonder what further evidence they could possibly be given that would be enough to bring them to belief!

Unfortunately for them, the proof is in Jesus' person, his authority from God and his obedience to God's plan for salvation.

And what of us today? The early Church lived as a new community united in Christ, as its head. The evidence that Jesus' authority did indeed come from God, lay in the fruits of their faith, expressed in the life of the community: a way of life seeking harmony, unity, love and faithfulness. The essence of all activity in those early Christian communities was

- a) to utilize each other's God-given gifts in order to build up, encourage and equip the whole church body.
- b) And thus enabled, to reach out beyond the community of believers to draw others in. They did this by spreading the gospel message (some through preaching) and by their living example.

How well is our church community characterized by these two guiding principles?

Let us each consider truthfully and prayerfully

- How good an advert am I for faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour?
- What are my gifts and how am I using them in the Lord's service?
- What are the gifts of others within this worshipping community, and how am I encouraging and building them up?
